Our Parish Annual Meeting will be held in the Social Club at 7pm on Monday 20th May. This is a community event, where as many as possible of our clubs, societies, associations and other organisations present themselves to our community. They join the Parish Council to explain to the community what they are doing and answer questions. The Parish Council will be introducing the Chairmen of our various committees for the coming year and their priorities. We will also be presenting a first outline of the results of our recent public consultation survey.

Goudhurst in Bloom will be judged during the last week of June with entries accepted until mid-June.Gill Wallis-Hoskin has confirmed that the awards will be made as follows:

- **The Dench cup** will be for the best cottage garden, not visible from the road.
- The Hugo cup will be chosen from the best noncommercial display; such as schools,preschools, war memorial, the Social Club etc.

80th Anniversary of D-Day

Thursday 6 June 2024 is the 80th anniversary of D-Day.

We will be commemorating the momentous history by raising flags in Goudhurst, Kilndown, and Curtisden Green, and by ringing bells.

On 6 June 1944, many first learned the liberation of Europe had begun from church bells, which had been silent for most of the preceding five years.

A flag-raising ceremony will be held at the Goudhurst war memorial at 9:30am on 6 June.

The school is also planning to include commemorative artwork in the fete on Saturday 8 June. More information, including timings, will be published on Facebook once confirmed.

Goudhurst's Plan Bee

St Mary's Churchyard & Victorian Cemetery

A project that's been in the making for a while now is how to manage the grassland around the church and our burial grounds in a gentler, more traditional way as would have been in done in centuries past to encourage our wildflowers and pollinators. Our churchyards are probably the most ancient and enclosed pieces of land in the parish.



Apart from grave-digging, the grassland will have been relatively undisturbed re-seeding naturally for hundreds of years.

It will also probably have been both



mown for hay and grazed by animals during its time as a burial ground.

The consequence of all this is a diversity of beautiful grasses and associated flowers, some of which may now be uncommon in Britain, just waiting for the chance to flower.

Sensitive management can enhance the sanctuary that a churchyard provides encouraging a diversity of plants and animals from magnificent yew trees and minute colourful lichen to animals such as slow worms, bumblebees and swifts.

Grassland Management Plan

Put simply we're going to mow less – remember it's No Mow May this month – and we'll see what comes up naturally. Of course we can't do this everywhere so we'll still cut the grass as now in the main areas around the front of church so it will still look neat and tidy.

However, we will be managing other areas to a medium length of up to 10cm by cutting just once a month. This will encourage low-flowering plants such as clover, bird's-foot trefoil and self-heal. In turn, the flowers will attract insects (bees in particular if clovers are present) and other invertebrates and small mammals.

We plan to have several areas of long grass which will allow more plants to flower and set seed so if the site really does contain unimproved old grassland then the range of flowers could be rather wonderful. Bees and butterflies will be attracted whilst beetles, grasshoppers and bumblebees will use the long grass for cover. However, this may take some time to happen so it might not look spectacular from day one. Remember – wildlife doesn't like neat and manicured but there will be plenty of interesting and wonderful plants if you look closely.

We have ordered signs from our friends



at Caring for God's Acre which will explain to everyone exactly what we're doing and why and we've briefed our contractors on what we're trying to achieve.

In particular, they will need to remove any grass cuttings as they can smother delicate plants and increase fertility at the expense of wildflowers. Plus it looks unsightly!

There are plans for a display at the entrance to the church too which will explain and show what we're doing – watch this space!

Yellow Rattle

This plant is really useful in creating and enhancing wildflower meadows. It is a semi-parasitic meadow annual which attached itself to neighbouring grasses through the root system and reduces the vigour of the grass. Wildflowers like less grass and impoverished soil. Where yellow rattle is present you can see that the grass is shorter and less dense. If you're doing this at home, sow yellow rattle seed in early autumn so that it over-winters in the soil. Sometimes it doesn't germinate well so keep trying for several years, we had a yellow rattle breakthrough last year and it's now exciting to see it spreading which will help our meadow no end

Beware of Hedgehogs and Strimmers!

We were overjoyed to see hedgehogs are out and about last month and we've captured several on our trail camera having a good feed at our hedgehog feeding station. The better weather means everyone is out gardening but please beware of hedgehogs when using a strimmer

because they like to hide in long grass and foliage. All it takes is to have a rustle around and make some noise so they move on before you cut. Or perhaps even better, don't cut the area at all!





Remember the Parish Council Office have a supply of hedgehog highway surrounds available for a small voluntary donation. And if you find a hedgehog out and about during the day, it needs to be taken to a rescue centre as being a nocturnal animal it is likely to be unwell. Our friends at Folly Wildlife Rescue will be able to help.



What care services do local councils provide?

Kent County Council can help you stay in your own home if you have care needs. They provide meals, carers, transport, home modifications and equipment that helps with the tasks of daily living, although you'll usually still need to pay something towards your care costs. If you have savings above £23,250 or a high income, you'll probably have to meet the full cost yourself.

If you have a disability or complex medical condition that means you have healthcare needs rather than social care needs, you might qualify for NHS funding.

Getting a local council care needs assessment

Contact the social services department of KCC to ask for a care needs assessment. It's free and it's your legal right to have one. You shouldn't be refused an assessment because the local council thinks your needs aren't great enough or that you won't qualify for financial help. There is an online form or you can call 03000 41 61.

KCC will identify your care needs and check that they meet a nationally agreed set of criteria. If you qualify for help, they have a legal duty to provide or arrange the services you need.

How to find out if you qualify for local council funding for care costs

Either at the same time as the needs assessment or soon after, KCC will carry out a financial assessment to see if you qualify for funding if they deem your needs as eligible when assessed against national criteria.

Deciding who manages your personal care budget

If you qualify for financial help, you can ask your local council to arrange the care services for you or receive direct payments from the local council and organise your care yourself. Alternatively, you can have a mixture of the two.
